There has also been a noticeable uptick in real estate activity in recent weeks, relative to the past eight months, as some of the latent buyer interest is beginning to transform into sales.



market update






The following charts show the inventory of active listings at the end of each month from Jan 2006 to Feb 2009, and the number of properties that sold each month.


North Vancouver

home inspectors

A common condition included in an offer to purchase a home is a clause that provides the buyer an opportunity to obtain and approve an inspection report on the subject property. Throughout Canada, home inspector training is voluntary as there is no requirement for home inspectors to be certified. As a result, a homebuyer may not be sure that home inspectors are qualified to do the work they are hired to do.

On January 30 of this year, the provincial government announced that BC will become the first province in Canada to license home inspectors to better protect buyers and ensure qualified inspections.

Effective March 31, 2009 anyone wishing to practice as a home inspector in BC will require a license. The British Columbia Business Practices and Consumer Protection Authority will be the regulator.

To become licensed, home inspectors will need to meet the qualifications of either the Canadian Association of Home & Property Inspectors, the Applied Science Technologists and Technicians of British Columbia, or the National Certification Program for Home and Property Inspectors.
