

market update







The following charts show the inventory of active listings at the end of each month from Jan 2006 to Jan 2009, and the number of properties that sold each month.

federal budget

Included in the January 27 federal budget were announcements pertaining to first-time homebuyers, and to homeowners who renovate in the next 12 months.

Since 1992, the **Home Buyers' Plan** allowed first-time homebuyers to withdraw amounts from their RRSPs to purchase or build a home without paying tax on the withdrawal. The recent budget increases the allowable maximum withdrawal to \$25,000 from \$20,000. Qualifying individuals who are joint purchasers can <u>each</u> withdraw the maximum amount. Also announced was a new **First-Time Home Buyers' Tax Credit** of up to \$750 in federal tax relief to help with the purchase of a first home.

A new **Home Renovation Tax Credit** can be claimed by homeowners, but only on 2009 tax returns. Eligible home improvement expenditures must have an enduring benefit, and be made after January 27, 2009 and before February 1, 2010 under agreements entered into after January 27, 2009. The available tax credit will be equal to 15% of eligible expenditures exceeding \$1,000, up to a maximum credit of \$1,350. Examples of eligible expenditures include renovating a kitchen or bathroom, replacing a furnace, installing new carpet or hardwood flooring, building a retaining wall, fence or deck, landscaping, or resurfacing a driveway. General repairs or maintenance, or purchasing furniture and appliances are not eligible.
